Towards More Powerful Telling

With Master Storytellers
Jan Andrews and Jennifer Cayley

In this two day workshop designed for tellers with prior performance experience, two of Canada's premier exponents of the art form guide tellers in the processes of digging deeper, finding within themselves the potential to offer more.

The approach is unique and dynamic.

Exercises explore issues of voice and physicality; individual coaching in a group context helps tellers connect more fully to the stories they tell.



Each teller brings a story to work on; each is given time for focused work related to particular needs. The atmosphere is supportive but challenging. No teller goes away unchanged.

Days start with experimentation in voice range, energy levels, body awareness. Participants then move into the storytelling circle, both to witness and contribute to the work of others, and to take the storyteller's chair themselves.

It's exciting, invigorating, dedicated. Light shines on unexpected story corners, new layers of meaning are uncovered. Lasting connections are made among those present. Tellers find media for affecting their listeners as never before.

Outcomes include: the ability to intensify listener engagement at all levels; enhanced awareness of storytelling's potential for contribution; increased sense of empowerment and satisfaction; community growth.
